Over the past ten years, we have invested more than \$50 million into academic, capital and programmatic improvements in order to achieve our 2020 Vision.

The Rosedale Renaissance helped jumpstart economic revitalization, from campus to the surrounding Polytechnic Heights neighborhood. The \$20-million Nick and Lou Martin University Center has sparked a vibrant rebirth in student life, with record numbers of students living on campus. Our faculty has revamped existing curricular offerings and initiated innovative new academic programs. Most importantly, our *Smaller. Smarter.* University provides individualized attention to students in intentionally small classes taught by extraordinary faculty to help students reach their full potential.

I believe that is why U.S. News and World Report has ranked Texas Wesleyan in the #1 tier of regional universities for nine consecutive years, and in 2020 gave us a promotion, moving Texas Wesleyan from a regional institution of higher education to a national university. Our work is attracting the attention of potential students and their parents. In fall 2021, we welcomed the largest first-year class in almost a quarter of a century.

We are on a roll. But there is so much more to do.

We recently adopted our new strategic plan – Engage 2025. The primary goals of this strategic plan are to increase retention and graduation rates; improve diversity, inclusion and equity; increase career services and job placements; modernize the campus; and secure the fiscal health of the University. We have mapped these strategic goals onto the operations of every aspect of what we do and who we are.

To reach these goals, we are launching *Engage. Inspire. Invest. A Comprehensive Campaign.* When we engage with our friends and alumni, we will inspire our community to invest in our students, faculty and staff. This investment will help us fulfill our mission: To change the world by changing lives, one student at a time.

CAMPAIGN PROJECTS

ENDOWMENT SUPPORT - \$10.5 MILLION

STUDENT SCHOLARSHIPS- Texas Wesleyan is committed to making higher education meaningful and affordable. That's why each year the University offers significant institutional aid to students through the support of donors. Increasing scholarship support allows Texas Wesleyan to recruit and retain motivated and deserving students. Many of our undergraduate students are older and have family obligations to consider while working toward their degrees; a significant proportion are from low-income households or are the first in their family to pursue a degree.

FACULTY ENHANCEMENTS- Endowed chairs and professorships are essential for recruiting and retaining top-notch faculty to lead rigorous and robust undergraduate, graduate and professional academic programs that engage in vital scholarship, teaching and research. These high-caliber educators also help keep curriculum relevant to current trends in the marketplace.



PROGRAMMATIC SUPPORT - \$8.5 MILLION

Texas Wesleyan University is continuously working to meet the ever-changing needs of its students, the local community and its stakeholders. Annual programmatic support allows the latitude to meet the needs that arise throughout the University's umbrella of services and outreach. ATHLETIC EXCELLENCE - \$17,810,000

ATHLETIC STADIUM: **\$16,500,000**- One of the University's highest priorities is the construction of a new stadium on campus. An athletic stadium will provide a facility for football practices and games, expand the track and field program, be an alternate site for soccer and a venue for Fort Worth ISD games and campus-wide events. Equally important, a new athletic stadium will provide economic revitalization to the University and the surrounding community by attracting event attendance to Polytechnic Heights,



which will benefit businesses and those living in the Poly neighborhood. This project will entail three phases: 1) Practice field, site development, synthetic turf installation, lighting; 2) Track and track equipment; and 3) Grandstands, press box, field house, restrooms and scoreboard.

SYCAMORE PARK IMPROVEMENTS: \$1,000,000- Improvements to the baseball and softball facilities will include installation of new fencing, grandstands, restrooms and a concession area. Upgrading the dugouts will bring the facility up to NAIA standards. These improvements will allow for baseball/softball clinics for youth teams to generate revenue for the athletics program and will also improve player recruitment efforts.

SID RICHARDSON GYM IMPROVEMENTS: \$310,000- To provide a better game experience for basketball and volleyball, the Sid Richardson Gym project will improve acoustics by adding sound-absorbing baffles and updating the sound system and the capabilities of the scoreboard, including technology for replays, streaming games and improving exposure for athletic sponsorships.



One-third of Texas Wesleyan undergraduates are student-athletes. This means athletics plays a major role in the retention, graduation and postgraduate success of our students. Giving to the *Engage. Inspire. Invest.* campaign is a major investment in helping athletics continue to shape our student-athletes into successful, team-driven problem solvers who will make things happen as next-generation leaders in our communities.

FACILITY UPGRADES - \$3,565,000

GRADUATE PROGRAM IN NURSE ANESTHESIA SIMULATION CENTER: \$2,000,000- The GPNA program facility expansion project will enhance three specific areas of the nurse anesthesia program for students: 1) Expansion from two simulation rooms to a full-scale simulation center, including three simulation labs and a centralized control room; 2) Expansion of the restroom areas to accommodate an increased number of students; and 3) Renovation of the student center and lounge. This will have a critical impact on preparing students for the medical environment.

SCIENCE CENTER: \$1,300,000- Funding will be used to reconfigure and expand the capacity of the existing single-use chemistry lab in the Ella C. McFadden Science Center to create three lab spaces, two for chemistry and one for computer-based work and general lab needs. Improvements to science laboratories are necessary to help ease course scheduling across the science curriculum and improve the marketability of the science program. Additionally, modernized facilities will improve safety and energy efficiency.


NICHOLAS MARTIN HALL: \$265,000- Audio and visual capabilities will be improved to allow for recording and streaming for both live and virtual events campus-wide. These upgrades will provide a strong space for academic activities, student organizations, university events and community groups to showcase their work.











UNDERGRADUATE STUDENT DATA POINTS






WAYS TO GIVE
